Course Title:	History of I	History of Bengal (from earliest time to 1204)						

#### **Course description**

This course examines historical development of Bengal before 1204. It includes the political and social changes of the communities since the prehistory period to 11 Centuries under various rulers and political regimes. The geographical features of the region will be analyzed to find elements which influenced the historical development of the region up to Gupta period.

#### **Course objectives**

The purpose of this course is to demonstrate how condition of Bengal continued to change despite internal conflict. Despite the odds the socio-economic conditions of Bengal underwent a significant improvement during the ancient period.

#### **Course Learning Outcomes (CLO):**

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- I. describe the historical background of the region;
- II. familiarize themselves with the sources of ancient history of Bengal; able to assess the significance development of administrative, social, political, economic and cultural conditions of Bengal during this period;
- III. interpret historical facts on the rise and fall of the dynasty and regimes;
- IV. explain the elements that contributed to the rise and fall of the kingdoms & a good grasp of the history of ancient Bengal would enable them to interpret events of medieval and modern Bengal.

#### **Course description**

This course surveys the civilizations of Indian ancient kingdoms. It begins with the civilizations at Indus Valley. The discussion continues with the rise of Buddhism and Jainism, the emergence of Mauryan and Gupta Empires and ended until the era of Delhi Sultanate.

#### **Course objectives**

This course aims at projecting socio-political and economic conditions of the Indian people under different rulers. It tries to demonstrate that despite a number of unsettles phases, created by internal strife and foreign invasions, Indian society continued to develop.

#### **Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)**

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- i. familiarize themselves with the sources of ancient history of South Asia;
- ii. discuss the uniqueness of multi-cultural and religious practices in the region;
- iii. analyse the various causes which contributed to the rise and fall of the kingdoms in south Asia; and
- iv. use historical facts and lessons to formulate a conflict resolutions path on current misunderstanding in inter-ethnic communications.

#### **Course description**

This course surveys the emergence of Islam in West Asia. It started with the discussion on Arabia before Islam and the coming of Islam in the 7th Century. It will discuss the social, economic, religious and political development under the leadership of the Prophet Muhammad at Madinah.

Subsequently, the discussion will be extended to the era of Khulafa' ArRashideen, the Umayyad Dynasty and the Abbasid period. This course ends in the era of the Crusades with a focus on political and diplomatic changes over the period.

#### **Course objectives**

This course aims to develop students' wider knowledge on religious history especially Islam as a part of their life. Students are expected to show an understanding of their own history from a historical perspective and analysis.

#### **Course Learning Outcomes (CLO)**

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- i. discuss the origins of Islam from a historical perspective;
- ii. compare the life conditions and structure before and after Islam in Arabia;
- iii. analyze the changes brought by Islam into the Arab civilization and the muslin world including in Bangladesh; and
- iv. evaluate impact of Islam on humankind whilst conclude the rise and falls of the Islamic kingdoms.

Course Title:	Introducing	g Sociology		

#### **Course objectives**

The course is designed to provide foundational knowledge of sociology as a social science. It will explain key concept, principles and perspectives in sociology. It will highlight various structural issues like major social institutions, inequality, social classes, population and urbanization. Besides this, the course helps the students to develop sociological thinking to understand society and human behavior.

#### **Course Learning Outcome (CLO)**

After going through the course, students will be able to learn the following outcomes
